0	imes like this often bring wonderful to speak to the heart and clarify the ospel.					
0	Oad & Mom – how do we respond in trials or during the hard phases of parenting? Our responses eveal our ruling desires (James 4:1-4)					
	■ If wrong desires rule the heart – we will create friction and in the home.					
	If the ruling desire of the heart is to please God, to know Him, and to find rest in Him alone, then:

The Gospel in the Home for All of Life						
0	"The gospel is a dramatic call away from a life based in idolatry" (Stuart Scott)					
	The unbeliever is ruled by his unregenerate heart which lives to obtain those(idols), under his own self-rulewhile being spiritually dead because of sin.					
	The believer has the Spirit of God alive in him/her so that the process of or sanctification is the life-long process of heart renewal.					
	 This gospel calls the unbeliever to turn from his self-seeking path and turn to God infaith in the completed work of Christ. 					
	■ This gospel gives the believer of his daily renewal through the Word of God by power of God's Spirit.					
0	With this view based on the gospel we demonstrate how the Scriptures guide our home and how right theology guides life.

0	Consider the reality (or myth) of controlling the behavior of children.
	• Children to the Lord. He lends them to us for a time.
	Since they are, it is a myth to gain comfort or confidence that we control their lives (remember the difference in heart vs behavior) or that we control the salvation of their souls – let's have confidence in Him who saves and not in our own efforts. (confidence in God's grace and the gospel)
	■ The authority you have over your children is given by God and you are to Him to properly carry out that role as a parent.
	• Our authority is not simply that we are older, bigger, more powerful, etc.
	Our authority is a given by God and needs to be modeled after how God "parents" His people (both Israel and the church through Jesus).
	With this biblical background:
	Provide guidance to the children.

	• in loving, open communication with the children.
0	In time the children will leave the home (that is what we are raising them to do) and if you have only exerted control, they easily move out from under that.
	■ Controlling behavior is not the goal – gospel-centered instruction is the goal.

0	Some challenges to anticipate as we disciple our children
	■ We might get comparing ourselves to others.
	■ Dad & Mom will sinful desires which might display impatience or anger.

	• We tend to want a "" – but life by faith does not consist of quick fixes.					
	 We tend to think that church attendance and involvement provides an environment that salvation and Christian growth. (the "garage principle") 					
0	Then our aim is outward, or "short-term" (good behavior now!) we will miss the opportunity of cointing the children to the wonder of God's grace toward them in Christ, and we will miss the opportunity of helping them see the beauty and wonder of the Gospel for their daily life.					
0	Rather than a focus, engage in the lives of your children with the goal of teaching in order to guide their heart to love the Lord above all.					
	■ Help them that God wants the worship of their heart – that knowing Him and finding meaning and pleasure in Him alone is what they were made for.					
	• them to see that heart obedience is right worship and that this is why we choose certain behaviors and standards.
